Management is in office each first Friday to assist with owner account questions, parking stickers, key fobs and overall questions we look forward to seeing you in December.



### TRASH REMINDERS



Large bulky items such as furniture, mattresses, construction materials ARE NOT PERMITTED IN THE **DUMPSTERS OR DUMPSTER** AREAS. The association has to pay separately to have bulk items removed. Please remember this and tell any contractors or vendors working in your unit of this rule. Bulk items can be taken to the nearby dump-389 Burns Crossing Rd Severn MD 410-222-6108. They have recently updated their drop off and it is extremely easy to

get in and out.

In connection with the recent discussions about rising insurance costs due to claims etc. We are including the below list to assist owners in remembering important preventative maintenance items that should be completed INSIDE your owner unit. Owners are required to utilize licensed and insured vendors for their repairs. Checking local sites such as thumbtack.com or Angi can help you locate a vendor.

### BASIC HOMEOWNER/UNIT OWNER MAINTENANCE CHECKLIST

## **Monthly**

- Inspect HVAC filters and replace if necessary. Most filters will need replacement every six months.
- Clean range hood and filters.

### Quarterly

• Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

### Semiannually

- Test hot water heater relief valve.
- Replace batteries in smoke detectors.
- Vacuum coils on refrigerator.
- Clean coils on HVAC units.

### **Annually**

- Have the HVAC system inspected, serviced and tested by an outside contractor.
- Inspect grout in kitchens and bathrooms and replace as needed to avoid future water damage.
- Inspect plumbing system (under sinks, dishwasher hoses etc) for leaks, scale and corrosion. Repair as needed.
- Check or have a plumber check your refrigerator ice machine line
- Inspect washing machine water hoses and valves. Replace if cracks, bulges or other defects are found.
- Flush hot water heater to minimize potential for scale that shortens service life.
- Test ground fault circuit interruption outlets/breakers by pushing test and reset button. Replace if malfunction is found.

### 2024 Budget Approval and Information on January Condominium Dues



Thank you to all of the owners who participated in the recent Budget Meeting and Special Assessment vote. As reflected in the approved budget, your regular monthly assessment for the 2024 fiscal year will be \$375.00. In addition, the community voted to approve a one time special assessment of \$368.40 for each unit. This amount can be paid either all at one time OR can be split out over twelve months of payments over the course of 2024. If you choose to split the special assessment payment out over the course of the year, your new monthly payment amount will be \$405.70. Owners will be receiving coupon booklets in the coming weeks for the 2024 year. ALL COUPONS will reflect the assessment broken out into 12 equal installments, regardless of how you decide to make your assessment payment. All owners will receive coupon booklets for reference, even those currently using an automatic payment method.

If you are mailing in a physical check to the lockbox, and do not receive your coupon booklet prior to mailing your payment, please be sure to include your account number and association ID on the bottom of your check for reference. Your account number and association ID can be found in your *current* coupon booklets for reference.

If you are using your own bill pay service with your bank, you will need to update your payment amount to reflect the new monthly payment of \$405.70 beginning with your January 2024 payment.

Important information/reminder for those signed up through First Citizens Bank Association

Banking Auto Pay: If you are using the First Citizens Payment Portal (Property Pay)and have a payment schedule already established which automatically pays your fees through this portal, our office will be able to automatically update your new payment amount directly and the new amount will automatically change as of January 2024. This only applies to registered Property Pay owners, you must contact your own bank if you utilize their services for bill pay. Please note that neither First Citizens Bank or Metropolitan have the authority to access or ability to change or delete any other information, or shut down your account, on your behalf- we are simply able to update the recurring monthly payment amount if you have a payment schedule. Any other changes to the bank account information that is included will have to be completed by each owner by visiting their portal at <a href="https://propertypay.firstcitizens.com/">https://propertypay.firstcitizens.com/</a>





# Leftover Thanksgiving Casserole

## **Ingredients**

- 1 1/2 cups turkey shredded
- 3/4 cup cranberry sauce
- 2 cups mashed potatoes
- 1 cup corn
- 1 cup turkey gravy
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 2 cups stuffing
- <u>chicken broth</u> or melted butter to taste



### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Preheat oven to 400-degrees. Combine turkey and cranberry sauce and spread evenly on the bottom of an 8×8 glass baking dish.
- 2. Evenly press on leftover mashed potatoes and sprinkle corn over the top.
- Mix together milk and leftover gravy and spread evenly over potatoes and corn. Sprinkle on leftover stuffing and lightly drizzle chicken broth over the top (this will keep the stuffing from drying out).
- 4. Cover with tin foil and bake at 400-degrees for 25-30 minutes or until heated through.

#### Variations to this recipe

Feel free to use whatever leftovers you have on hand. It doesn't have to be exactly the same as what is listed here. Some ideas to try:

- Substitute rice for mashed potatoes.
- Substitute peas, carrots, or green beans for corn, or use more than one vegetable depending on what you have on hand.
- Substitute croutons or bread crumbs for the topping if you don't have stuffing leftovers.
